

Where does the data from the Antarctic Treaty come from?

The data contained in this database on Parties to the Antarctic Treaty and the Environment Protocol and on the approval of Recommendations and Measures derive from the official data maintained by the United States State Department as Depositary of the Antarctic Treaty.

Why was Antarctica included in the Inter-American Treaty of Reciprocal Assistance?

On 2 September 1947, the quadrant of Antarctica in which the United States was interested (between 24° W and 90° W) was included as part of the security zone of the Inter-American Treaty of Reciprocal Assistance, committing its members to defend it in case of external aggression.

Is Antarctica a 'preserved landscape'?

The preserved landscape we identify is somewhat unique given that it lies on the periphery of one of the 'great basins' of East Antarctica, which are of substantial interest as potential locations of past/future margin retreat via marine ice sheet instability 56, 64.

Is Antarctica a sovereign country?

Personnel present on Antarctica at any time are always citizens or nationals of some sovereignty outside Antarctica, as there is no Antarctic sovereignty. The majority of Antarctica is claimed by one or more countries, but most countries do not explicitly recognize those claims.

How many countries were in Antarctica during the IGY?

The original signatories were the 12 countries active in Antarctica during the International Geophysical Year (IGY) of 1957-58: Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Chile, France, Japan, New Zealand, Norway, South Africa, the Soviet Union, the United Kingdom, and the United States.

Which countries rejected the idea of internationalization of Antarctica?

This idea was rejected by Argentina, Australia, Chile, France, and Norway. Before the rejection, on 28 August 1948, the United States proposed to the claimant countries some form of internationalization of Antarctica, and the United Kingdom supported this.

The national IPAWS (Integrated Public Alert & Warning System) sends weekly tests every Monday at 11 AM local time, separated by timezones. This is an internal test and usually not seen/heard by the public. Other state and local authorities may send additional EAS tests at any time. Some tests might activate emergency alerts on cell phones.
