What did BES do in ancient Egypt?

Who was BES in ancient Egypt?

According to some modern scholars,Bes was associated with minor Egyptian deitiessuch as Segeb,Tetetenu,Ihty,Aha,and Amam,among others. He was associated with the goddess Beset,who by the way was seen as Bes' feminine aspect. In some accounts,Beset is revered as the mother of the falcon-headed god Horus.

Why is BES called BES?

Bes was a grotesque dwarf god whose frightful appearance and demeanor served to banish malevolent spirits. His name likely came from the ancient Egyptian verb besa,"to protect."

Was Bes a hard-working Egyptian god?

Bes was certainly one of the harder-working Egyptian gods. He held a significant role in the daily lives of the ancient Egyptians,especially the common folk. He was responsible for a range of important aspects,primarily centered around protection,well-being,and joy.

When did BES come to Egypt?

Bes,the Egyptian protector of households stands out in a lot of ways against the rest of the Egyptian pantheon,starting with his appearance. It's believed that Bes first arrived in Egypt during the Middle Kingdom,around 2055-1650 BCbut didn't rise to real prominence until the New Kingdom. During that time,his appearance changed a great deal.

Is Bes a god or a goddess?

Being a protective deity,Bes came to be associated with many Egyptian gods and goddesses. Examples of those deities include Amun,Min,Horus,Reshef,Ra,and Hathor (also known as the Distant Goddess). According to some modern scholars,Bes was associated with minor Egyptian deities such as Segeb,Tetetenu,Ihty,Aha,and Amam,among others.
