

Where is Bouvet Island?

Bouvet Island (/ˈbuːveɪ /BOO-vay; Norwegian: Bouvetøya [buˈvøːə]) is an uninhabited island and dependency of Norway. It is a protected nature reserve. It is a subantarctic volcanic island, situated in the South Atlantic Ocean at the southern end of the Mid-Atlantic Ridge, and is the world's most remote island.

How did Bouvet Island become a dependency?

The expedition carried out aerial photography of the island and was the first Antarctic expedition to use aircraft. : 64 The Dependency Act, passed by the Parliament of Norway on 27 February 1930, established Bouvet Island as a Norwegian dependency, along with Peter I Island and Queen Maud Land.

How did Bouvet Island get its name?

At that point, the island was given its current name of Bouvet Island ("Bouvetøya" in Norwegian). In 1930, following resolution of a dispute with the United Kingdom over claiming rights, it was declared a Norwegian dependency. In 1971, it was designated a nature reserve.

Who is Baron of the Bouvet Islands?

A king penguin in Edinburgh Zoo, Major General Sir Nils Olav III, carries the title Baron of the Bouvet Islands. ^The internet domain suffix .bv is allocated to Bouvetøya, but has never been used.

Are there Penguins on Bouvet Island?

Due to its importance as a bird breeding area, BirdLife International has designated Bouvet Island an Important Bird Area. Macaroni penguins, chinstrap penguins, and Adelie penguins can be seen on Bouvet Island, along with seabirds like southern fulmars, Cape petrels, and numerous albatross species.

Bouvet Island was discovered in 1739 by the French navigator Jean-Baptiste-Charles Bouvet de Lozier (1705-86), for whom it is named. It was rediscovered by a German expedition in 1898, and Norwegian expeditions to the Antarctic in the 1920s claimed it for Norway as a potential whaling station. The Norwegian flag was first hoisted over the island in December 1927; it was ...

The closest lands to Bouvet are more than 1000 miles away. Queen Maud Land of Antarctica is just over 1,000 miles and Cape Town is about 1600 miles away. Therefore living off of this island and depending on shipments could be quite the challenge. Bouvet Island is a frozen inactive volcano. The majority of the island is covered by a glacier!

Bouvet Island is a remote, uninhabited island in the South Atlantic and is considered the most isolated island in the world. It is a dependent territory of Norway and covers an area of around 49 square kilometers. This land mass is just over 6 times the size of the island of Wangerooge. The total length of the coastline is 30 km.

The island is named after Jean-Baptiste Charles Bouvet de Lozier who first spotted it in January 1739. He was on the hunt for a large southern land mass and assumed Bouvet Island was part of it. At the time he was unable to navigate around it, so was unaware that it was an island. He named it Cap de la Circoncision.

Bouvet Island (called Bouvetøya in norwegian) is 49 square kilometer in area. About a quarter of this is taken up by a caldera, called Wilhelmsfjeldet. The highest point of the island is on the caldera rim, Olavtoppen, at 780 meter; it was climbed for the first time only in 2012. The ice-filled caldera itself is 250 meter below the rim.

BOUVET ISLAND, a territory of NORWAY, is known as one of the peri-Antarctic islands, small uninhabited rocks and volcanic islands that circle the frozen continent. It was discovered by Jean-Baptiste Charles Bouvet de Lozier, a lieutenant in the French East Indies Company, on New Year's Day, 1739, but not found again until nearly a century later.
