Bulgaria has the Kozloduy Nuclear Power Plantwith two pressurized water reactors (together 2000 MW net). Four old and unsafe VVER-440/230 reactors (4 x 408 MW net) were taken off-line in 2004 and 2007). The two active reactors cover almost half of Bulgaria's electricity demand. [9]

When did Bulgaria start using nuclear power?

Bulgaria's first commercial nuclear reactor began operation in 1974. [5]The Kozloduy NPP operates two pressurized water reactors with a total output of 1906 MW. This makes Bulgaria the 21st-largest user of nuclear power in the world.

The Ottomans ruled with a centralized system much different from the scattered local power centers of the Second Bulgarian Empire. The single goal of Ottoman policy in Bulgarian territory was to make all local resources available to extend the empire westward toward Vienna and across northern Africa.

In August 718 AD, the Bulgarian army had come to the rescue, breaking the siege and destroying the Arab army and thus preventing an Arab invasion of Southeastern Europe.
