Are solar panels a scam?

That is, of course, also a scam. To protect yourself from clean energy scams: Know that "free" or "no cost" solar panel offers are scams. The federal government does not install solar systems in homes for free. How do I avoid solar panel scams?

Knowing about solar scams and what to look out for can help you protect your assets and prevent you from becoming victimized. To avoid solar panel scams, we strongly recommend doing your own research and verifying that your solar company is legitimate before signing any contracts. Take time to make the right decision: Never rush into a contract.

What if my company offers solar energy?

If your company offers solar energy, remember that claims must not only be truthful, but also comply with established consumer protection laws, including the FTC Act and the FTC's new Impersonation Rule. Be truthful. Every clean energy company has a responsibility to be honest and upfront with consumers. Be transparent about what you're offering.

What should I do if a solar business is a scam?

Protect your personal information. Don't respond to unexpected requests online or on social media for your name, address, or other personal information to "see if you qualify." At best, this is someone generating leads to sell, not actual solar businesses. At worst, they're scammers trying to steal your identity.

Can a solar energy audit help you save money?

The so-called official offers you an "energy audit" to reduce your utility costs. Or they might try to sign you up for a "free" program to make your home more energy efficient with solar energy. While they might say they're from your utility company or the government, they're not.

How do I know if a solar contract is a scam?

Pay attention to warranties, cancellation policies, payment schedules, and try to spot any hidden fees. Honest businesses will give you time to go over the terms of the contract, understand the agreement, and let you sign it in writing. To learn more, visit [ftc.gov/solar](https://www.ftc.gov/solar). And if you spot a scam, tell the FTC.
