Are solar panels a scam?

What are American Solar scam calls?

American Solar scam calls are fraudulent calls in which a scammer poses as American Solar or a similarly named company. Their goal is to gain personal information by making bogus offers for free or low-cost solar energy services.

How do I know if a solar energy company is a scam?

Look out for callers that create a sense of urgency, offer unbelievable deals, or solicit personal information. Legitimate solar energy companies won't ask for private information like dates of birth, Social Security numbers, or financial details. What should I do if I receive a suspicious call about solar energy?

Are solar energy scam calls dangerous?

Solar energy scam calls can be dangerous, and falling victim to one can bring about severe consequences like financial fraud and identity theft. The good news is that there are ways to spot a scam and get out of it unscathed. Since phone scams often use the same tactics, it stands to reason that they come with many of the same warning signs.

Are solar business leads a scam?

At best, this is someone generating leads to sell, not actual solar businesses. At worst, they're scammer trying to steal your identity. If you spot a scam, tell the Federal Trade Commission at [ReportFraud.ftc.gov](https://www.ftc.gov/identity-theft).

How do I report a solar scammer?

Report misleading ads on social media: For starters, if you see false or misleading advertisements or claims from a solar scammer on social media, flag the post for removal. Report fraud to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC): You can report instances of fraud on the FTC website.

Be aware of solar energy scams - everything from scammers pretending to be affiliated with the government or utility company to businesses misrepresenting the cost of improvements, savings, and financing options.
